Indoors, seductive stagings of blue and green can re-create nature's calming palette. The renowned retreats of history's rich, famous, and royal are full of them. Catherine the Great recruited the cool color duo in her St. Petersburg winter palace (now one of five buildings in The Hermitage museum complex). George IV favored blue and green for his father's library, which he had transplanted to the Royal Pavilion at Brighton. The library's mint green walls soar up to a trompe l'oeil ceiling, where puffy white clouds skid across a pale blue sky. Well pleased, the king chose the blue-and-green palette again for his own bedroom at the pavilion. Played one off the other like rhyming couplets, blue and green are twice as effective in tandem as they are on their own: They caress, calm, and coddle. They wash across a space gently, visually enlarging their surroundings. Unlike in-your-face warm colors that incite an adrenaline rush, their demands are few, making the blue-and-green scheme a contender for any space where soothing serenity is the order of the day.
